Coordination occurs through the Umatilla County Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC). The methods of communication include nearly monthly meetings at which time information is shared and discussed on the progress we are making towards the identified grant goals. Financial reports are shared. Sub-committees are formed that include discussion and presentation at the LPSCC meetings. Applications and reports are shared and voted upon for acceptance.

B.6) Describe how the program coordinator communicates with all program partners concerning program participants and any other matter necessary for the administration of the program.

Communication will occur across electronic media and personal contact. It is intended that the team identified as required by HB4002 will continue to meet on a regular basis and identify changes deemed necessary to continue the program. In addition Umatilla County LPSCC has a nearly monthly meeting and the deflection program and associated updates are a standing agenda item since program inception. All the partners listed earlier are members of the Umatilla LPSCC as required by Oregon law and are regular participants.

CCS provides culturally and linguistically responsive services by integrating cultural values and beliefs into treatment planning, using appropriate assessment tools, and offering services in multiple languages. We also engage in ongoing professional development related to cultural responsiveness along with trauma informed approaches and strive to understand and respect the diversity of our clients. Our workforce is representative of the communities we serve, inclusive of a large Latino/a/x CCS workforce in those counties we serve with high Latino/a/x populations in addition to having numerous staff throughout the agency trained as certified Spanish interpreters. Consistent with our evidence-based CLAS centric clinical policies, we are committed to serving our significant Hispanic/Latino population while continuing to bolster our already large Hispanic/Latino bilingual staff capacity. Furthermore we contract with two agencies who are able to provide interpretation in most any language at any time, in addition to accommodating ASL needs

As part of our overall deflection program we have developed extensive outreach that provides direct contact with persons leaving our local jail. Community Counseling Solutions provides staffing and an actual van that is located in the parking lot near the releasing gate of the county jail. Peer mentors and a case manager are present 3 days per week allowing coordination between jail diversion, MOUD, deflection, and other behavioral health clients. In addition this is co-located at the Community Corrections office allowing Probation Officers the opportunity to engage their clients with Community Counseling services. This service is now active although we have not used this pathway for deflection although intend to include it beginning in October of 2025. The key players are Community Counseling Services including both mental health and substance abuse treatment, Community Corrections, Umatilla County Sheriff's Office, Umatilla County.

The deflections operations team (DOT) and law enforcement officers are in charge of making decisions regarding the officer intervention pathway. LE has the discretion regarding arrest or issuing a cite and release citation on individuals facing a Drug Enforcement Misdemeanor (DEM). The citations are forwarded to the DOT who then conduct a Criminal History and review each clients information. Outreach is conducted and attempts to locate the person is conducted. Once eligibility is determined persons engage in assessment and treatment. The key players for this pathway include Peer Mentor Supervisor, Program Coordinator, Case Manager, and Deputy District Attorney, Law Enforcement Officers, Sheriff's Office, Community Counseling Solutions.

Officer Intervention: As part of your deflection program, will arrests or citations be made,

charges be filed, or charges held in abeyance?

Once a person is accepted into the program charges are held in abeyance pending treatment completion or failure

of the program. Successful completions then require a response from the Program Coordinator such as request for

expungement or notice of failure to complete.

We are implementing three different tracks within this pathway.

Track one will involve the jail MOUD program providing MAT services. Those person identified will complete a

medical and ASAM assessment followed up a peer navigator and engage in services.

Track two will include partnering with the MIP which is a partnership with two municipal courts. A treatment and peer

navigation option will be created providing ASAM assessment and referral to tx services. This will allow opportunity

to deflect sentencing.

Track three will be with Community Corrections. CC may make referral to the deflection program on those cases

that are DEM Conditional Discharge with proper risk/need assessment. Persons will realize a peer navigator,

receive an ASAM assessment and engage in services as recommended. CCS will work closely to expedite the

treatment process to assist persons goal of reaching EDIS status for early completion.
