Dear Voters,

This Voters' Pamphlet is provided for assistance in casting your vote-by-mail ballot. Local candidates and committees have paid to have their material printed here. Candidate statements are printed as submitted and not all candidates submit material. All federal and state candidates will appear in the states' section. Not all races will be on each ballot type.

Your ballot packet will arrive by mail approximately 3 weeks prior to election day. Enclosed you will receive your ballot and return envelope. *The county has chosen to discontinue the secrecy sleeve for cost savings and election board worker ease.* To vote, completely fill in the oval to the left of the response of your choice. When you have completed voting be sure to **sign the voter's oath on your return envelope.** Your ballot cannot be counted without your signature.

If you lose or spoil your ballot you may request a replacement ballot by calling our office at the number listed below. One will be mailed to you provided the request is made with sufficient time for mailing. Otherwise, you may pick up a replacement ballot in person at the county elections office. Office hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. on election day. If you have moved or changed your mailing address you may update by going to www.oregonvotes.gov. All **new voter** or party change registrations must be received or postmarked by April 28, 2026.

Election day is May 19, 2026. Ballots must be received by 8:00 p.m. on election day in a designated drop box or **postmarked by the USPS on that day.** Ballot drop sites will be available from April 4, 2026 through election day. Ballot deposit locations and hours available for use are printed in this section.

Unofficial returns will be posted on our website at www.umatillacounty.gov after 8:00 p.m. on election day. For questions or assistance in voting please contact our office at 541-278-6254.

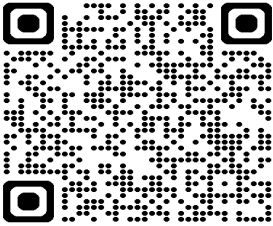

How the Primary Election in Oregon Works

Each major political party uses the Primary Election to nominate their party candidates for the November General Election. Each state has different rules governing Primary Elections. In Oregon, major parties have the option of choosing a "closed system," meaning only registered voters in that party can vote for candidates of the same party. Or, a major party can choose an "open system" where the major party allows registered voters who are not registered with any party to vote for candidates in their party's Primary Election.

Example of the "closed system": If you are registered with the Democratic Party, you may vote for Democratic candidates, nonpartisan candidates and local or state measures. You cannot vote for a candidate from any other party in the Primary Election.

Example of the "open system": The Republican Party can announce they are going to "open" their Primary Election so people who are not registered with any party can vote for Republican candidates in addition to, the nonpartisan candidates and local or state measures.

If you are registered with a minor political party or as a nonaffiliated voter, only non-partisan and local races will appear on your ballot. Office for the US President, US Congressional, US Senate and State Partisan races will not be listed.

All registered voters can participate in the General Election of the nominated candidates.

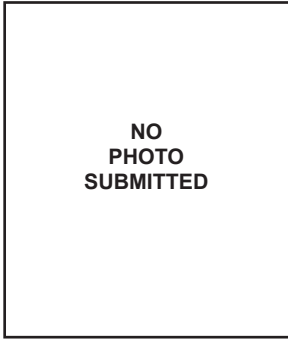

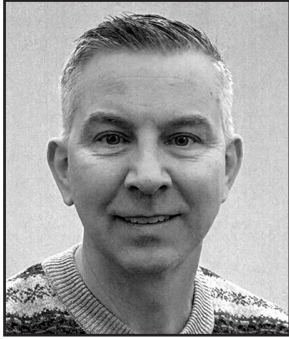

Argument in Favor

The Pendleton City Council is asking voters to support this measure to help maintain reliable fire and emergency medical services for our community.

Pendleton Fire and Ambulance responds to thousands of calls each year, many of which involve urgent medical emergencies. In recent years, emergency call volume has increased significantly while staffing levels have not kept pace with that demand. As demand for emergency services continues to grow, maintaining adequate staffing is essential to ensure timely response when residents call for help.

This measure provides dedicated funding that can only be used for fire and emergency medical services. The majority of the funding supports firefighter and paramedic staffing to improve emergency response capability.

A smaller portion of the funding supports essential operational needs such as maintaining emergency vehicles and equipment, inspections, and systems that help ensure emergency responders remain ready to serve the community.

Argument in Favor

Pendleton Fire and Ambulance responds to approximately 4,600 calls for service each year, an increase of 64% since 2018. Most of these calls involve medical emergencies where trained firefighters and paramedics provide lifesaving care.

Today the department operates with a minimum staffing of seven firefighters per shift, and eight when fully staffed. At minimum staffing levels, this typically allows three ambulances to be in service to respond to emergencies across Pendleton.

This measure would increase minimum staffing from seven firefighters to eight, ensuring an additional ambulance can be available when the department is operating at minimum staffing levels. When fully staffed, staffing would increase from eight firefighters to ten, allowing one additional ambulance to be placed into service compared to current operations.

Currently Station 1 maintains four personnel, while Station 2 operates with three on minimum staffing days and four when fully staffed. This measure would improve emergency coverage by allowing two ambulances to respond from each station during minimum staffing conditions, rather than the current configuration of two from Station 1 and one from Station 2.

When someone in Pendleton calls 911, they expect trained firefighters and paramedics to arrive quickly and provide help when it matters most. This measure helps ensure those responders are available when the community needs them.

While most calls involve medical emergencies, firefighters must also remain ready to respond to fires, rescues, and other emergencies.

I was transported for advanced treatment and later woke up three days later in a hospital in Boise, Idaho. I recovered without lasting deficits.

BONDS FOR CAREER, TRADES, TECHNICAL EDUCATION CENTER; EXPAND STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES

QUESTION: Shall District construct a Career, Trades, Technical Education Center by issuing \$4,980,000 in bonds, estimated to maintain current tax rate? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11 b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Athena-Weston School District seeks bonds for a facility to expand student opportunities for career, trades, science, and arts education. The District was awarded a \$4,980,000 State grant that is available only if bonds are approved.

If approved, bonds are expected to finance capital costs, expected to include:

- Provide a new, energy-efficient Career, Trades, and Technical Education Center at the District's Athena campus with flexible, ADA-compliant learning spaces; and
- Minor upgrades to repurpose vacated classrooms at Weston-McEwen High School following creation of the new Center.

A citizen oversight committee would be established to ensure proceeds are used for purposes indicated. Audits required. Bonds would mature in 10 years or less from issuance, may be issued in multiple series, and would not exceed \$4,980,000 in principal amount. Bonds are estimated to maintain the District's 2025-2026 bond property tax rate of \$1.24 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Actual levy rates may vary due to final interest rates and changes in assessed value.

Explanatory Statement

Athena-Weston School District (AWSD) asks voters to approve up to \$4,980,000 in general obligation bonds to provide a new, energy-efficient Career, Trades, Sciences and Technical Education Center.

No Increase in Current Tax Rate

AWSD's existing school bond, approved in 2016, had a bond tax rate of \$1.24 per \$1,000 of assessed value from the most recent 2025-2026 fiscal year. The existing school bond will end this year. The proposed new bond would not overlap with the existing school bond and is estimated to maintain the current bond tax rate of, with no tax increase. The proposed bond would be repaid within 10 years of issuance.

Matching Grant from the State Funds 50% of Project Cost

AWSD has been awarded a \$4,980,000 State matching grant. The Grant is available only if voters approve the bond measure. The Grant and bond proceeds would each fund half of the total project cost of \$9,960,000.

Expanding Student Opportunities for Career, Trades, Science, and Arts Education

The proposed Center is approximately 12,000 square feet and would allow for expansion of current learning space. It would include energy-efficient HVAC, windows, and insulation, and be built to modern ADA accessibility standards. The Center is expected to include:

- Modern science labs with adjacent instructional space, with current safety features and additional fume hoods for experiments
- Modern art studio with dedicated ceramics workspace, supplies and material storage, and display space for student work
- Wood and metal shop with adequate electrical capacity, modern dust collection system, materials storage, air conditioning, and updated mechanical ventilation
- Multi-purpose classroom, including space for agricultural science
- Additional parking

The Center would be built on District-owned property. The project also includes minor upgrades to repurpose vacated classrooms at the High School, following the creation of the Center.

Limitations in Existing Classrooms

Students in career, trades, science, and arts programs at Weston-McEwen High School use outdated spaces.

- Science labs lack modern lab stations, instructional space, and safety features such as updated eyewash stations. The low ceilings and the availability of only a single fume hood limit experiments. The agricultural classroom lacks lab stations.
- The art room is crowded and has no dedicated space for ceramics, material storage, or display of student work.
- The shop building, originally constructed in 1970, lacks air conditioning and mechanical ventilation and has an older dust collection system in failing condition. The original electrical system is end-of-life and has inadequate capacity to power current equipment or to expand equipment. Students are limited by lack of workstations and material storage capacity.

Community Oversight

If the bond is approved, AWSD will establish a Bond Oversight Committee composed of community members to review and monitor project expenditures.

Effect of a "Yes" or "No" Vote (Informational)

- Yes vote: Authorizes AWSD to issue general obligation bonds to help fund the new Career, Trades, Sciences, and Technical Education Center. The measure is estimated to maintain the current bond tax rate.
- No vote: Rejects issuance of the bonds. Students would continue using existing classroom spaces with the limitations described above.

Argument in Favor

I voted no last November. I want to be straight about that. The 2025 bond was too big, covered too many projects, and I wasn't confident it was the right use of my tax dollars. I said so with my ballot.

This is a different proposal, and I think it deserves a different answer.

The school board went back to the drawing board. What came back is a single, focused project: a Career, Trades & Technical Education Center. No sprawling wish list. The scope is smaller, the ask is honest, and the plan is built around what voters actually said they could support.

On the tax rate: the district's 2016 bond finishes this year. This new bond is designed to step right into that same slot, maintaining the current rate of \$1.24 per \$1,000 assessed value. You won't see an increase on your tax bill.

The state is also offering \$4.98 million in matching funds through Oregon's OSCIM program, but only if local voters approve the bond first. That's real money that could make a real difference in our communities.

I'm a careful voter and I don't give my support easily. But I think the board listened, made the right adjustments, and brought back something worth approving. A focused bond. No tax increase. A dollar-for-dollar state match. That's a responsible use of public dollars.

The science labs lack the ceiling height and ventilation required for the experiments students are supposed to be doing. The agriculture program has outgrown what it has to work with. These aren't facilities waiting to be upgraded; they're facilities actively limiting what our students can accomplish.

We want people to understand: the programs themselves are strong. The students are motivated. The teachers are doing everything they can with what they have. What's missing is a facility that matches the quality of the people inside it.

And the timing is genuinely good. The 2016 bond is paid off, so this one holds the tax rate steady at \$1.24 per \$1,000 assessed value. Oregon has committed a \$4.98 million OSCIM match (dollar for dollar!) that only comes through if voters say yes.

Our kids are showing up and doing the work. It's time the facility did too.
